


The LCC 2023 Club Membership is still open! Click the button below to get rolling. We look forward to having you among us this summer.


LCC Gran Fondo

A moment in time



This section is for my history buffs and cycling aficionados. It'll cover an interesting historical tidbit, for fun, inspiration and sometimes pure ridicule.

With the most recent edition of Milan-San Remo, I thought I would do a quick exposé of one of the most memorable editions of this race. The 1992 edition saw the great Sean Kelly go against the formidable Moreno Argentin and the win, as always, was down to the Poggio climb and the final sprint on the Via Roma. King Kelly was feeling good this season but didn't want to show his cards too early. Kelly mentions: "If I could win there [San Remo] the pressure would be off for a while. In the race, Argentin was super strong. When he attacked on the Poggio it looked as though he was gone for the day." Argentin built a sizable gap and Kelly was no where to be found. However, on the descent, the irishman was cycling like a man possessed, taking massive risks to close the gap. "People say I took a lot of risks but it didn't feel like that at the time. I went as fast as I could but was always under control. I caught him with only 1k to go and pulled a few faces when he turned around shouting at me to come through. I told him that I wasn't able. Every time he turned to me I moved slightly off the wheel so that he would see the chasers coming fast behind and get a bit nervous. It worked and he kept rolling along. He led out the sprint so I was able to come off his wheel although he didn't make it too easy." Kelly won the sprint after 298 Km of cycling and after descending the Poggio like a madman.
